







OUR LONG-TERM VISION FOR EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION

Significant Need for Additional State Investments

Delaware has made progress, including: doubling the number of children served in high quality pre-K and making 3,000 more children eligible for Purchase of Care (POC). And there are still significant needs today in Delaware:

- Too few families are served in public programs: Only 19% of children under age 5 are served in publicly funded early care and education
- Families cannot access state assistance: Delaware families must earn below 200% of the Federal Poverty Level (below \$60,000 yearly for a family of 4) to be eligible for public programming. Most states serve families up to 250% of FPL and beyond
- Lack of child care is holding back our economy: Parents are leaving the workforce and employers are facing staffing shortages
- · Child care providers continue to operate with limited openings due to low reimbursement rates and staffing shortages

Policymakers: Invest, Expand, and Streamline Today

- Expand access to quality: Make transformational investments that provides access for any family that chooses to participate in a universal pre-k program, ages 0-5
 - Pay for the cost of quality early care and education, removing family contributions or limiting to no more than 7% of income
 - Provide funding for all children in mixed delivery settings, leveraging the strengths of current mixed delivery system to meet families' needs, including type of care, hours of coverage, and support for special needs
- Streamline funding and programs: Streamline funding and consolidate governance to make access easier for families and programs
 - Move Purchase of Care (POC) and state funded early care and education (ECAP) into a single agency and align eligibility criteria and program standards
